Student Pledge Against Gun Violence Background Information

What Is The Student Pledge Against Gun Violence?

October 17, 2000 is the national kick-off for this year's Student Pledge Against Gun Violence. This initiative, founded several years ago by Mary Lewis Grow of Northfield, Minnesota, has grown into a major national event.

The initiative provides students the opportunity to come together each fall to publicly denounce gun violence by signing a pledge that they will (1) never carry a gun to school; (2) never resolve a dispute with a gun; and (3) always use their influence to keep friends from resolving disputes with guns.

By giving students a common pledge and the choice to sign it in the company of their peers, while knowing that students across the country are doing the same, we help young people realize their collective ability to reverse the violence that has affected too many young people over the years.

This initiative is supported by the American Federation of Teachers, the American Association of School Administrators, the American Medical Association, the National Council of Churches, the United States Congress and the President of the United States.

The National Day of Concern is October 17, 2000, but Student Pledge events will take place across the country throughout the fall. Even if October 17th doesn't fit into your school calendar, you can host a Student Pledge event at any time.

Student Pledge Against Gun Violence Pre-Event Promoting Ideas

Information Booths

★ Have a booth at Homecoming events, in the school lunch room or other locations where students gather that offers information about the Student Pledge Against Gun Violence. Provide copies of pledges for those who are unable to attend the event, hand out bookmarks, sell t-shirts etc.

Black and White Day

★ Have a Black and White Day when teachers, student council members and/or others wear the Pledge t-shirt or black and white to school to promote the event.

Pledge Posters

★ Hang posters with the Student Pledge logo around the school. Ask area businesses and others if you can post a Student Pledge poster in their window.

School Newspaper

- ★ Print Student Pledge logos in newspaper and advertise the Student Pledge event.
- ★ Write a news story about the Student Pledge event.

T-shirts

- \star Give to those who take the pledge.
- ★ Give a few out as door prizes.
- ★ Sell t-shirts as a fund raiser.

Black and White Ribbons

★ Hand out black and white ribbons to those who take the pledge.

Festive Atmosphere

- ★ Have the cheerleaders/school mascot.
- ★ Hang black and white balloons and streamers.
- ★ Play some music.
- ★ Have a light show.

Speakers

- ★ School principal, student council president or other council members, student council advisor.
- ★ Local person who has been the victim of gun violence who would like to come and share his/her story. (Remember, if they are under age 18 you will need parental permission.)
- \star Local doctor who can come in and talk about what a bullet really does to a body.

Student Pledge Logo

★ Enclosed are Student Pledge logos. Think about using them as bookmarks, posters, t-shirts, folders and/or stickers.

Student Pledge Against Gun Violence Reporting Your Pledges

Teaming Up With An Elementary School

- ★ High school students are not the only ones that experience peer pressure to use firearms inappropriately. Many elementary school students are also exposed to gun violence in their homes and on the street. There is a special Student Pledge that elementary school students can take. Think about teaming up with an elementary school in your area and help those kids be gun safe.
- ★ Perhaps you can plan a Student Pledge event for the elementary school. Or, maybe you can sponsor an elementary school Student Pledge poster and/or essay contest.
- ★ Don't forget to report the number of pledges.

Student Pledge Against Gun Violence Media

Why Media?

So why promote your Student Pledge event? Well, it informs your community that students in your area are concerned about gun safety, it encourages others to become more involved and it increases the awareness of your efforts.

Also, you need to consider that students in the audience during the Student Pledge will be photographed. Typically, when someone is under the age of 18, a parent or guardian must sign a permission slip before they can be photographed. Talk with your student council advisor and/or school principal about whether or not you would like to invite the media to your Student Pledge event.

Or, you may wish to prepare a media kit that you send out to your local media after the event in lieu of inviting the media to the event itself. In this case you could write a news story about the event and send photographs (with the appropriate parental permission slips signed).

News Advisories

The purpose of a news advisory is to alert the media and invite them to attend and report on an upcoming event. It is not a news release. An advisory should cover the essentials of an event, covering the basic who, what, where, when and how questions. News advisories need not be more than one page.

- ★ Use letter size paper.
- \star List the name and telephone number of a contact person.
- ★ Send the advisory to your local paper's community section.
- \star Send the advisory about one week prior to the event.

Student Pledge Against Gun Violence News Releases

Writing Releases

Good news releases must answer the who, what, where, when, why and how questions and do so in the first one to two paragraphs.

A news release need not be long, technical or contain million dollar words to get used. The more concise, factual and clear your release is, the better the chance of it being used.

News releases are written in a style known as the "inverted pyramid." With this style, the most important information goes at the beginning of the release. This enables a reporter to glance quickly at the news release and get the facts in the first sentence or two. This is also how stories are written in the newspapers, so it ultimately organizes the information in the most useful manner for the reporter.

Written Format

- ★ Determine the four or five most important elements you want to say about the subject. Then rank them in the order of importance. Arrange the paragraphs to reflect the priorities you have established.
- ★ If you wish to reference specific data or statistics, provide the source of information so the reporter can cite the reference.
- ★ Tailor your release to the specific outlet. If you are sending the release to your community newspaper, focus on the community angle.

Layout

- ★ Use letter size paper.
- ★ Provide a contact name and telephone number for follow up questions.
- ★ News releases should always be typed and double spaced.
- ★ If your release goes beyond one page a "more" should appear on the bottom of a continuing text page. On the upper left corner of the second page, use one or two words to identify your release, so if pages get separated they can be identified.
- ★ If you must continue onto a second page, try not to break paragraphs or sentences. In addition, don't separate words with hyphens, put an entire word on one line.
- ★ A "###" or "end" denotes the end of a news release.
- \star Send the news release immediately following the event.
